The fourth graphic outlines the impact that regular lateness has on schooling. In saying this, it is also important to note that our tamariki do need to remain home if they are unwell.

ROPS Kaitiaki of Pūrerehua



At ROPS we have an abundance of swan plants growing in many spaces to support the butterfly life cycle. Unfortunately, the increase of wasps in our community has decreased the number of caterpillars that survive through to adult butterflies. Wasps feed on eggs, caterpillars, chrysalis and even

butterflies! A group of Year 6 Eco Warriors in 2022 designed, helped build and painted a caterpillar enclosure to safely house any caterpillars and eggs the students found in the kura and community to safely nurture them to adult butterflies. This year the enclosure has been put

to use and, thus far, has released 60-70 butterflies in the past three months! Many students of all ages keep watching the enclosure and express a lot of



wonder at the metamorphosis they see happening on a daily basis. Students are still finding caterpillars to put into the enclosure, it has been a resounding success. The 2023 Eco Warriors replenish the enclosure regularly with swan plants and keep it clean. Thanks also must go to apprentice builder Benjamin McConnell, an ex-ROPS student, who turned the

enclosure design into reality with the help of the Kauri 2022 Year 6 Eco Warriors. The next goal is to attract and nurture endemic butterflies of Aotearoa.

Measles

Are you and your whanau protected from measles?

With people travelling overseas again, there's a risk that someone with measles could unknowingly bring the disease back to Aotearoa.

Measles spreads easily and quickly, usually between people who are unimmunised or only partially immunised. It can be serious and life threatening. In the 2019 measles outbreak in Aotearoa more than 30% of the people infected had to be admitted to hospital.

The best protection against measles is the free MMR vaccine. It will protect you and your whānau, and prevent the virus from spreading.

You will be protected against measles if you:

- had 2 doses of the MMR vaccine
- had measles before
- were born before 1 Jan 1969.

If you're unsure if you or your tamariki have had any or both doses of the MMR vaccine, check by calling your GP or hauora provider. Alternatively, check your Plunket Well Child Tamariki Ora book. If you're still not sure, be safe and get immunised - there are no safety concerns with having an extra dose. MMR vaccines are free at your local health provider and many pharmacies.

As measles still occurs in many countries, if you're travelling overseas these holidays it's especially important to be immunised to prevent the risk of being unknowingly infected and causing an outbreak in Aotearoa on your return.
